


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What does this temporary placement plan accomplish?

- ✓ Provides timeline commitments that the disability advocacy is looking for
- Demonstrates progress towards government's commitment to close large
 DSP residential programming
- √ A phased approach allows for sufficient time to ensure discharge planning capability will be in place in all ARC/RRCs
- Existing gridlock in the full continuum of residential programming across DHW and DCS will not be adversely impacted meaning clients requiring placement in the absence of community capacity can be placed on a temporary status
- ✓ Strikes a balance between government's commitment to closures and duty to support Nova Scotians in need





What about the existing residents in ARC/RRCs?

As community capacity increases (availability of smaller residential community options) existing clients will continue to have access to temporary placements in ARC/RRCs

A revised placement policy will be created through stakeholder input to ensure fairness and equity

The principle of fairness and commitment to the roadmap will drive the policy's creation $\begin{tabular}{ll} \hline \end{tabular}$

With the roadmap's commitment to close larger facilities overtime all ARC/RRCs will have a discharge plan to transition to community options

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
